INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this pre-application is to bring the applicant and the Department together in order to determine the eligibility and feasibility of a proposed New Jersey CDBG-DR project. It is designed to begin a discussion that may lead to the submission of a full SAGE application and funding or to a determination that the proposal as structured does not meet NJ CDBG-DR Program requirements.

New Jersey's CDBG-DR Program is intended to assist with the recovery in the most impacted and distressed areas, which have been declared a major disaster in 2011 under title IV of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 5121 et seq.) the November 16, 2011 (76 FR 71060) and April 16, 2012 (77 FR 22583) issues of the Federal Register. Funds are to be used only for specific disaster-related purposes. Eligible grantees may use CDBG-DR funds for recovery efforts involving housing, economic development, and infrastructure, if such use does not duplicate funding available from Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), or the Small Business Administration (SBA). The FR Notice strongly encourages incorporating preparedness and mitigation measures into rebuilding activities in the affected areas. This pre-application will be used in the assessment of community impacts and unmet needs to guide the development and prioritization of planned recovery activities. Prospective applicants for assistance from this DR Program are required to submit a pre-application prior to submitting a formal request.

Requests must clearly meet one of the three National Objectives of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, section 105(a) and (24 CFR 570.480 et seq.), as amended. Applicants must describe the problem to be addressed and certify that the actions proposed will provide an appropriate solution and can be readily implemented. Grants may not exceed \$1,000,000 unless compelling reasons for exceeding that amount are accepted by the Department.

Only eligible municipal or county governments may apply. They may apply on behalf of public agencies and may sponsor assistance to non-profit agencies, developers, and other entities to support qualified activities. Direct assistance to for-profits must be in the form of a loan to acquire or renovate fixed assets (plant and equipment); not for operating capital or inventory. Loan terms are negotiable based on the borrower's ability to carry debt, a reasonable rate of return, and benefits to low income people and to the community at large. However, NJ CDBG-DR funds may not be the primary source of financing. Similar requirements apply when non-profits are assisted; however, the terms may be more generous and NJ CDBG-DR funds may be the primary funding source in such cases.

A public hearing is **NOT** required at this time, but one must be held prior to the submission of a full SAGE application.

PRE-APPLICATION INSTRUCTIONS

1. Project Summary Description

Passaic County is applying for the CDBG-DR Disaster Recovery Program funds on behalf of the nine communities most severely impacted by the flooding resulting from Hurricane Irene. These nine communities include:

- Wayne Township
- Pompton Lakes Borough
- Little Falls Township
- Paterson City
- Passaic City
- Woodland Park Borough
- Totowa Borough
- Hawthorne Borough
- Bloomingdale Borough

Two activities will be undertaken: Public Facilities: Buy outs and Public Facilities: Infrastructure Rehabilitation and Housing Rehabilitation. Attached is a chart that details the 2 activities, and the communities involved in each one. In addition, the County is requesting \$600,000 for administration. This represents approximately 5% of each activity and is included in each budget below.

The most pressing need identified by the municipalities was the relocation of occupants from properties subject to severe repetitive loss and repetitive loss due to flooding. As noted by Hawthorne: The residents of properties to be acquired have been evacuated ten times since 2007 due to flooding. The floodwaters have been high enough to be two feet deep on the first floor of two of the properties, and up to the first floor on the third. All three houses have had damage to their basements, first floor areas and utilities. There is a significant risk to the residents and emergency personnel in this area with the increasing severity of flooding at an increasing frequency. The area has experienced flash flooding on two separate occasions,

stranding residents in their homes, and forcing emergency evacuation by boat. These operations put both the residents and emergency personnel at risk, particularly at night.

The possibility of loss of life and property exists with each storm. Elevation of property, shown as a rehab program, was requested in Pompton Lakes to compliment FEMA approved activities and address the needs of occupants that have refused relocation. The two infrastructure projects will prevent flooding by moving storm water away from properties that have been flooded in the past.

Each community has identified a number of properties that might be included in the Acquisition of Real Estate: Buyout. The grant allocation that the communities have agreed to apply for will not cover all of the properties that should be acquired, therefore communities will target the sites closest to the river. If they fail to reach an agreement from these homeowners, they will continue down their list of priorities until the grant allocation is fulfilled.

The NJ CDBG-DR funds will be used for all the costs associated with acquisition, related costs for purchase and demolition. Typical costs associated with the buyout of properties (based on the actual experience of communities involved in the process with FEMA) include:

Property acquisition costs range from \$150,000 to over \$300,000, depending on the community.

FEMA funding obtained by the communities is limited to Pompton Lakes and Little Falls. Although a past recipient of FEMA funds, Wayne Township does not have a current contract with FEMA. Several communities have committed local funds or intend to apply for funding through NJDEP Green Acres and Open Space to obtain the funds they need to complete their local projects. Funds provided by FEMA or other sources are indicated on the CDBG-DR Table and the sum is \$11,827,388.

Communities have indicated that the acquisition program is expected to take 2-3 years. There are some communities that are able to move more quickly as they are working with FEMA at this time.

Public Facilities: Infrastructure Rehabilitation

Budget: \$ 2,317,283

Total Beneficiaries: 47,112

Two communities have requested funds for public infrastructure rehabilitation. Passaic City and Bloomingdale Borough will both use CDBG-DR funds to undertake storm water projects in low-mod areas. The existing storm drainage system was compromised by the effects of Hurricane Irene and need to be rebuilt.

The Passaic City project will involve the remediation and upgrade of soil erosion along McDanold Brook. The entire project area would include: from the entrance of the box culvert from the Broadway side of 3rd Ward Memorial Park to a point at which it is underground at Main Avenue.

- 1) Engineering and Design
- 2) Conduct hydrological study on water flow from box culvert
- 3) Restore lower stream bed to original depth
- 4) Install storm water piping to straighten out water flow at streams curve point
- 5) Reconstruct stream wall
- 6) Rehab pedestrian walking bridge and replace pedestrian pathway
- 7) Remediate soil erosion
- 8) Address drainage from grassy surfaces
- 9) Re grade adjacent stream land surface and elevate

Because the main arteries of the City, Passaic Avenue and Main Avenue, go through this area, the entire community will benefit.

In Bloomingdale the reconstruction of the collapsed storm line near 125 Main Street will include the following:

1. Acquisition of Drainage Easement
2. Install a new Type "B" Inlet at the south curb line of Paterson Hamburg Turnpike.
3. Install approximately 48 linear feet of 14"x23" Elliptical Reinforced Concrete Pipe from the existing manhole to the new Inlet
4. Install approximately 160 linear feet of 14"x23" Elliptical Reinforced Concrete Pipe from the new inlet toward the river, following the line of the old 15" VCP
5. Install a concrete end treatment reinforced with Rip Rap slope protection

There are no other funds associated with either project. All project costs, including engineering, will be paid with the CDBG-DR funds. At this time it is premature to have any engineering estimates or detailed work write-ups. Detailed scopes of work are still being explored by the municipal and county engineers. As details are developed, we will share these with NJDCA.

The schedule for these projects is to complete all work within 3 years of the receipt of grant funds.

Housing Rehabilitation

Budget: \$ 233,271

Total Beneficiaries: 12

Pompton Lakes has requested funds for the rehabilitation of 12 properties. The original Borough request to FEMA was to elevate significantly more properties but after further consideration, it was determined that most had to be demolished. The homes to be elevated are architecturally suited to elevation.

Rehabilitation cost per unit is estimated to be \$184,556 including all professional services and site remediation. Soft costs associated with the project include:

Pompton Lakes estimated that the timeframe to complete the rehabilitation program is 30 months.

2. Qualifying Statements

Public Facilities, Acquisition of Real Estate: Buy outs

Of the seven communities that will use funds for buyouts and clearance, two are eligible low – income activities. The other five, as shown below, are Urgent Need. The following are Urgent Need activities:

The Notice provides that Urgent Need is presumed and many of the usual CDBG requirements are waived. The acquisitions to be undertaken under this activity clearly relate to the storm damage caused by Hurricane Irene. Under the Necessity section, the FEMA qualification will be more fully examined.

The following are Low-mod activities:

Under the Notice, the Passaic County exception limit of 41.32% applies to all the communities except Wayne Township with an exception limit of 26.25% and Passaic City and Paterson City which comply with the 51% low mod.

The cleared homes will be converted to park land for community-wide use. Overall Paterson is 69% low-mod. The attached map shows the low-mod areas of the City of Paterson.

Wayne Township will use CDBG-DR funds to demolish properties in two areas – Hoffman Grove and Buttonwood.

The Buttonwood Area acquisition (map 2 – Buttonwood area close-up) will complete the total buyout of this area. The township has acquired and converted the land surrounding these two properties to park area. Access to the neighborhood is fairly limited so the only users of these park lands are going to be neighborhood residents in the rest of the Census area encompassed by CT 2463.00 BG 2 and BG3 as shown on map 1.

This area is cut off from the rest of Wayne Township by the NJ Boynton Branch line and Conrail line and Route 23 creating a distinct neighborhood.

The Hoffman Grove area (map 3 – Hoffman Grove close-up) is also a distinct area. It is a small part of CT 2363 BG 4 which is predominantly low income as defined by the Wayne Township exception limit.

The Township's intention is to buyout and convert as much of this area to parkland as possible. The area is isolated by the NJ Boynton Branch line. Although access is limited to Main Road, residents of the surrounding area within 2463 BG 4 and 2463 BG 1 are expected to access this park area.

As a federal entitlement, HUD is very aware of the location and use of Township parks and has agreed that the isolating factors of geography and income create distinct neighborhoods with distinct needs for services that the wealthier parts of Wayne Township do not require.

Public Facilities: Infrastructure Rehabilitation

Two public facility infrastructure rehabilitation projects have been identified as critical to prevent flooding in Bloomingdale and Passaic City. These projects resulted in damage that occurred due to Hurricane Irene. Both projects meet the low mod criteria.

The Bloomingdale project involves the reconstruction of a storm sewer line near 126 Main Street, Census Tract 1165 BG 3.

The sewer line carries storm water to the river from uphill locations. The collapse of the sewer line, due to the impact of Hurricane Irene, now results in localized flooding for the residents of this low income area.

The Passaic City project involves the reconstruction of a channelized stream that acts as a storm water conduit. The sidewalls of the stream collapsed in the flooding. Without this storm drainage capacity, the main arteries of the City will be flooded. Overall the City of Passaic is 69.41% low income.

Housing Rehabilitation

The Borough of Pompton Lakes will elevate 12 homes above flood stage. This project meets the Urgent Need criteria. The homeowners have not yet been qualified but it is understood that they will only be eligible for assistance if their income is under 120% of median income. It is unlikely that the beneficiaries will be under 80% of median and meet the LMI criteria.

3. Necessity of Funding

Explain why this project would not proceed without NJ CDBG-DR funds.

In the last 5 years Passaic County has received 6 Federal Disaster Declarations, 4 of which were declared due to extensive damage caused by flooding for both individual assistance as well as public assistance. Passaic County has an approved Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation plan and a risk assessment was performed that describes the losses and sets goals, objectives and strategies to guide in our mitigation activities. One of our highest countywide hazards is flooding which possesses the highest potential for damaging physical assets, people and operations in Passaic County. The number of severe repetitive loss properties in Passaic County continues to increase due to the severity and number of occurrences. Mitigation efforts are a fundamental means to addressing these issues. Several of the affected municipalities have received HMGP, FMA and SRL grants to assist in mitigation efforts but a large number of severe repetitive loss properties still remain and have not been addressed. This grant will further assist these municipalities in alleviating the devastation that their residents incur as well as the danger that the first responders encounter when evacuating their residents.

The nine participating municipalities in this CDBG-DR application have experienced severe repetitive flooding for decades. The 2011 disaster, Hurricane Irene, was especially devastating to Passaic County, continuing the pattern of repetitive loss and severe repetitive loss for local residents and businesses. Data from FEMA indicates that Passaic County properties represent 35% of all New Jersey properties experiencing severe repetitive losses and 15% of all New Jersey properties experiencing repetitive loss.

The Passaic River Basin Commission Report, issued in January 2011, recommended that the following actions be implemented to address flooding in Passaic County:

1. Property Acquisitions: The Advisory Commission recommends expanding and expediting floodway property buyouts. ...funds should continue to prioritize structures in those areas of the floodplains most susceptible to regular, chronic flooding.
2. Structure Elevations In Floodplains: The Advisory Commission believes that home elevation projects in flood prone areas should be encouraged if acquisition is not an option to either the homeowner or the municipality. The Advisory Commission recommends that a new, state funded grant and/or low-interest loan program be established to effectively leverage available FEMA mitigation funds.

FEMA and the NJ Department of Environmental Protection's Blue Acres Program have provided some funding to purchase residential real estate, or elevate homes that have experienced severe repetitive losses, however, this funding is not sufficient to purchase and/or elevate all of the homes which have been impacted. Without CDBG-DR funding the residents of the nine participating communities will continue to experience severe repetitive losses and place residents at significant health and safety risks.

No funding is available for the implementation of public infrastructure projects in the Borough of Bloomingdale and the City of Passaic where local infrastructure was significantly damaged due to Hurricane Irene, causing local flooding and severe repetitive loss to residents adjacent to this infrastructure.

We have held numerous meetings with representatives of the nine municipalities most severely impacted by Hurricane Irene and the municipalities have reached a consensus on the programs and funding requests that they require to assist their communities. The local government officials from our nine disaster impacted communities have the most immediate knowledge of the devastating consequences of the flooding on their communities.

4. Construction Cost Estimates/Prevailing Wage Acknowledgement/ Certification of Deficiencies

No cost estimates prepared by an engineer are available at this time. Cost estimates for real estate acquisition, substantial rehabilitation and public facilities have been provided by each municipality, based upon tax assessments, and past experience.

APPENDIX Pre-Application – NJ CDBG-DR Program

Compliance with National Objectives

Applicants must document how each activity for assistance addresses at least one of the national objectives of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974:

- 1.) primarily benefit people of low and moderate-income,
- 2.) prevent or eliminate slums or blight,
- 3.) address an urgent need of recent origin when no other funds are available

If your application is intended to primarily benefit people of low and moderate-income and to eliminate slums or blight, please follow the instructions below and the application instructions in this document. If you are claiming 3 and need further guidance, contact NJDCA's Neighborhood Programs Unit/NJ Small Cities CDBG Program at 609-633-6283, or 609-633-6277 for guidance.

Benefit to Low and Moderate-Income People

If several activities, the percentage benefit must be calculated for each activity. Then the separate calculations must be combined to obtain a percentage benefit for your project as a whole. Before you start your calculations, take a moment to understand the following standards, definitions, and requirements.

Definition of Low and Moderate Income (L/M)

Low and moderate income people are those having incomes not more than the "moderate-income" level set by the federal government for the HUD assisted Housing Programs. This income standard changes from year to year and varies by household size and the metropolitan statistical area. The HUD Income Guidelines for communities are posted on the Program's webpage under General Information, <http://www.nj.gov/dca/divisions/dhcr/offices/cdbg.html>.

L/M Benefit Requirements

For each activity principally benefiting low and moderate income people the applicant must document that:

- 1.) those served by the activity are presumed to be low and moderate-income and provide 100 percent benefit to persons of low and moderate-income, e.g., elderly (senior citizens), disabled adults, homeless persons;
- 2.) at least 51 percent of the people in an area served by the activity are low and moderate-income. **Note:** counties and municipalities that have been granted an exception by HUD to the above percentage may continue to use the exception for CDBG-DR funds; or
- 3.) housing (see below).

Area Documentation (Required only if claiming number 2 directly above)

To document that the activity primarily benefits people of low and moderate income, the applicant must determine the area that will be served by each activity and submit one or more maps that show clearly:

- a. the extent of the facility service area;
- b. the location of the specific structures and facilities to be assisted with Small Cities CDBG-DR Program funds;

- c. the names of the streets in the facility service area;
- d. a delineation of all structures by use with vacant structures noted; and
- e. the Census tracts and block groups and their boundaries within which part or all of the facility service area is located.

Document each claim for area wide low and moderate-income benefit with the most recent US Census data or with a current income survey of area residents. Surveys must be conducted within 18 months of the application's submission.

Census: If the area that will benefit is the entire municipality or a discrete Census area, submit the low and moderate income percentage of the Census area. You may obtain low and moderate-income percentages from the Small Cities program, if you identify the specific Census area(s) in which the proposed activity is to take place. Census data is available on the NJ Small Cities CDBG Program's webpage.

Note: If the area of benefit is smaller than the smallest Census area, you may still use the Census information rather than conduct a survey IF the area of benefit contains at least 50 percent of the total number of people residing in the complete Census area. **However, Census data covering an area smaller than a block group is not acceptable.**

Survey: If the service area cannot be described with Census data, you must conduct an income survey using the Low/Moderate Income Benefit Worksheet and Income Survey Form included in the Instructions for completing an Income Survey on the NJ Small Cities CDBG Program's website.

Note: The applicant or grantee must show how the percentage of LMI persons was calculated. The percentage of LMI persons must be calculated from the entire population of the service area, and not from the proportion of participants who responded to the survey. If for example, a town in rural America with a population of 640 conducts a census of the entire population to determine the percentage of LMI persons, and gets an 80 percent response rate. Fifty-one percent of 640 is 326, and 80 percent of 640 is 512. Of the 512 respondents, 326 of them should be LMI persons. It is inaccurate to use 51 percent of 512 which is 261. (HUD, Notice CPD-05-06, July 26, 2005)

Housing Programs

All housing rehabilitation programs must be targeted to people of low and moderate-income, as defined by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development. The HUD Income Guidelines for communities are posted on the Program's webpage under General Information, <http://www.nj.gov/dca/divisions/dhcr/offices/cdbg.html>. CDBG-DR allows for the rehabilitation of housing occupied by people with incomes up to 120 percent of the HUD median income limit for the county. Households with incomes above the HUD income limits will not be considered to meet the national objective of benefit to low and moderate-income.

Preventing or Elimination of Slums or Blight

Applicants who claim that their activities meet the national objective of eliminating or preventing slums or blight (rather than claiming benefit to low and moderate income people) must document this claim by showing that the activities proposed will be carried out in an "area in need of rehabilitation" or a "redevelopment area" as set forth in the New Jersey Local Redevelopment and Housing Law (NJSA 40A:12A). There must be a substantial number of deteriorated buildings in the area. The boundaries of the redevelopment area and all proposed improvements must be clearly delineated, and the activities to be assisted with funds must be limited to those that address one or more of the conditions that contributed to the deterioration of the area. The disaster declaration will fulfill the requirement for the area in need of rehabilitation or redevelopment.

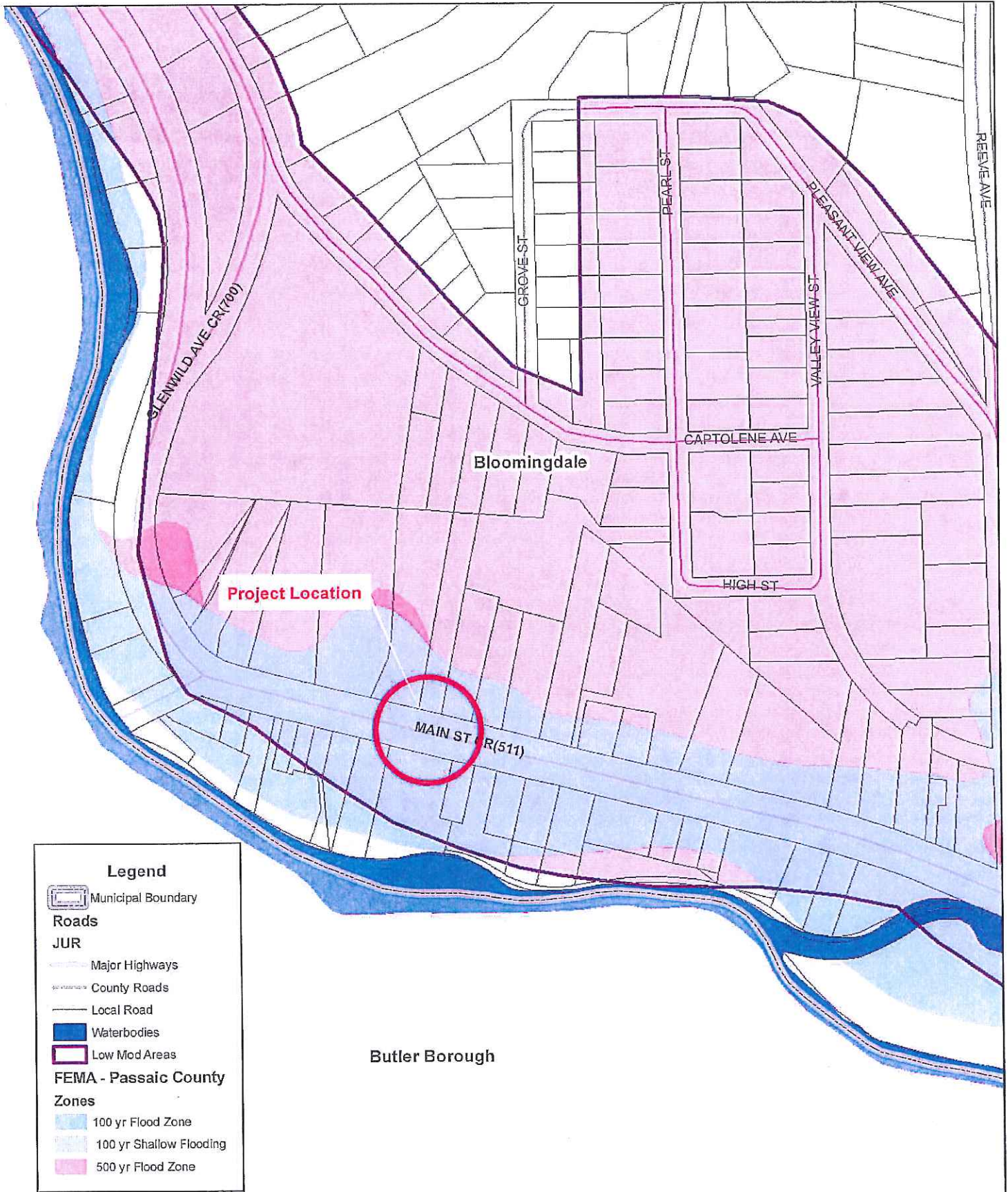
Note: Projects that remove slums and blight either through rehabilitation or by demolition, which when completed provides an area benefit, may be considered as meeting the national objective of benefit low and moderate-income, if at least 51 percent or the exception percent of the beneficiaries in the service area are people of low and moderate-income. Refer to the L/M Income requirements above.

Urgent Need

Under the Federal Register Notice for the CDBG-DR Program, the County and municipalities are not required to issue formal certification statements. Instead, they must document how each project or activity funded under the urgent need national objective responds to the disaster related impact identified by the local community. In addition, since major disasters present unique challenges and recovery can take years, it is not necessary for an activity to begin within 18 months of the disaster in order to use the urgent need national objective.

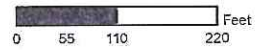
The county and municipalities should still be mindful of the low and moderate-income benefit national objective for all activities that qualify under such criteria. At least 50 percent of the entire CDBG-DR grant award must be used for activities that benefit low and moderate-income persons.

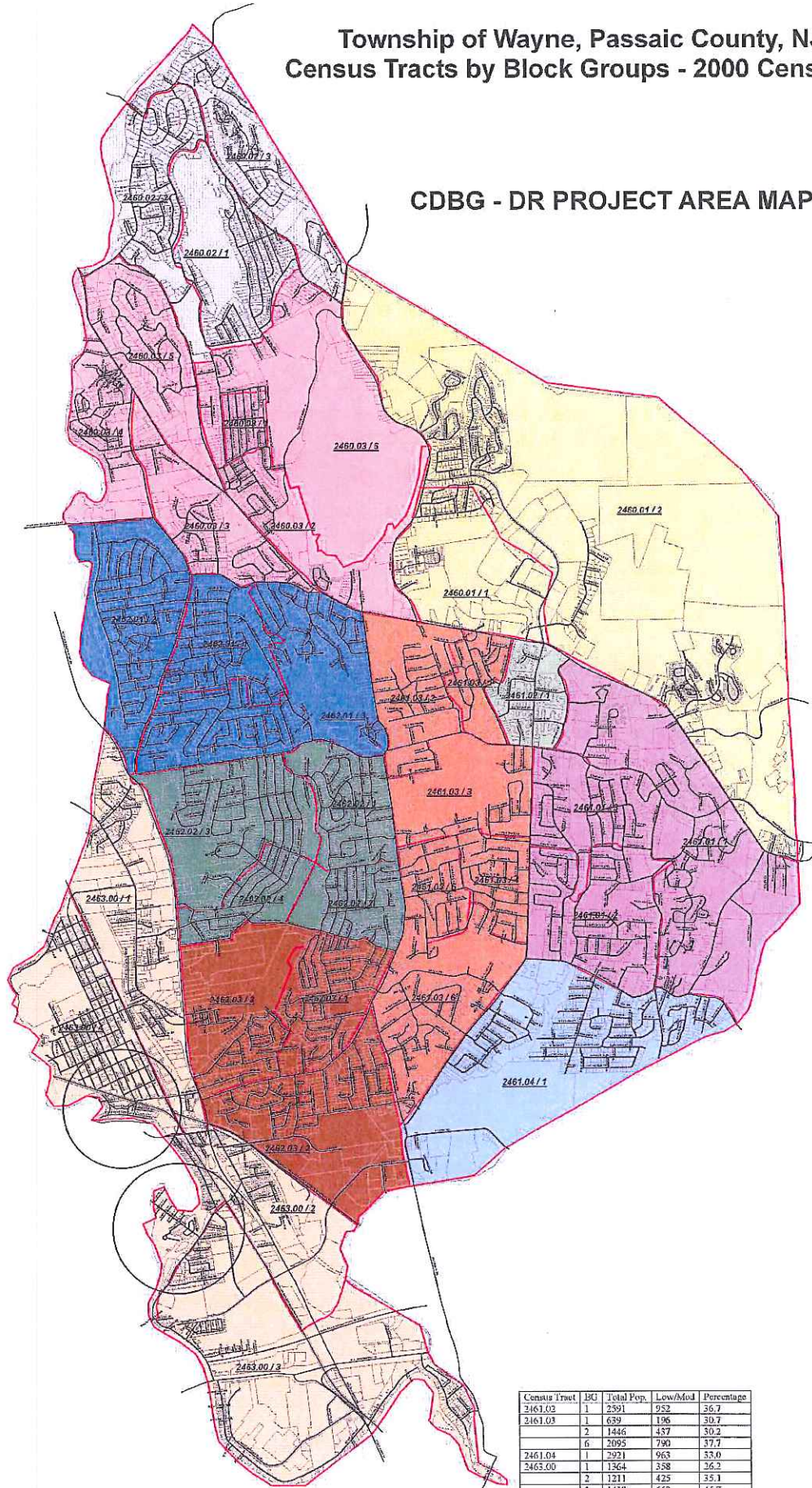
