RATIONALE FOR AMENDMENT

"The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act," CARES Act which was signed into law on March 27, 2020, provides funds through the CDBG, ESG and HOPWA programs. The CARES Act provides for allocations of funds to prevent, prepare for, and respond to coronavirus.

County of Passaic has been notified by USHUD that a special allocation of \$881,057 has been made to the County under the CARES Act, public law 116-136, under CDBG CV 3.

The County has identified the use these funds to provide wrap around services that will support the Department of Human Services program: Impact Passaic- Housing Security Initiative. Proposed activities include: legal services to ensure that residents are not evicted; payment of utilities; and case management (identification of additional services required by at risk residents/families). Total Funding: \$881,057; Program Costs: \$831,057; Administration costs: \$50,000.

PR-15 Summary of the citizen participation process

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) granted several waivers to program procedures to expedite the use of these funds. These waivers included an ability to amend the Citizen Participation Plan and allow for a much shorter timeframe for public display, use of the internet to make the Substantial Amendment available to the public and use of virtual meetings to allow for input and comment. Passaic County advertised the Substantial Amendment for CDBG-CV3 on April 16, 2021 and made the Substantial Amendment available to the public for a period from **April 16, 2021 to April 22, 2021**.



In addition, in the case of properties owned and occupied by moderate-income (not low-income) families, an assessment or charge may be made against the property for public improvements financed by a source other than CDBG funds if the jurisdiction certifies that it lacks CDBG funds to cover the assessment.

Excessive Force -- It has adopted and is enforcing:

1. A policy prohibiting the use of excessive force by law enforcement agencies within its jurisdiction against any individuals engaged in non-violent civil rights demonstrations; and
