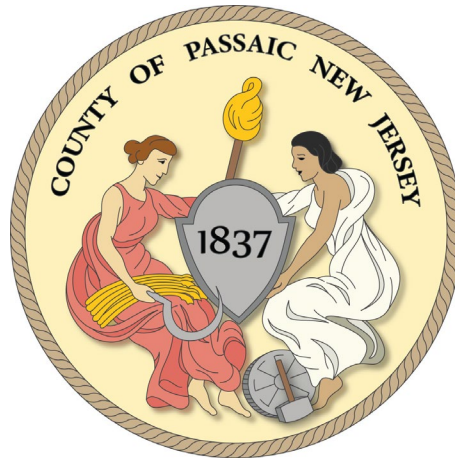

County Overview

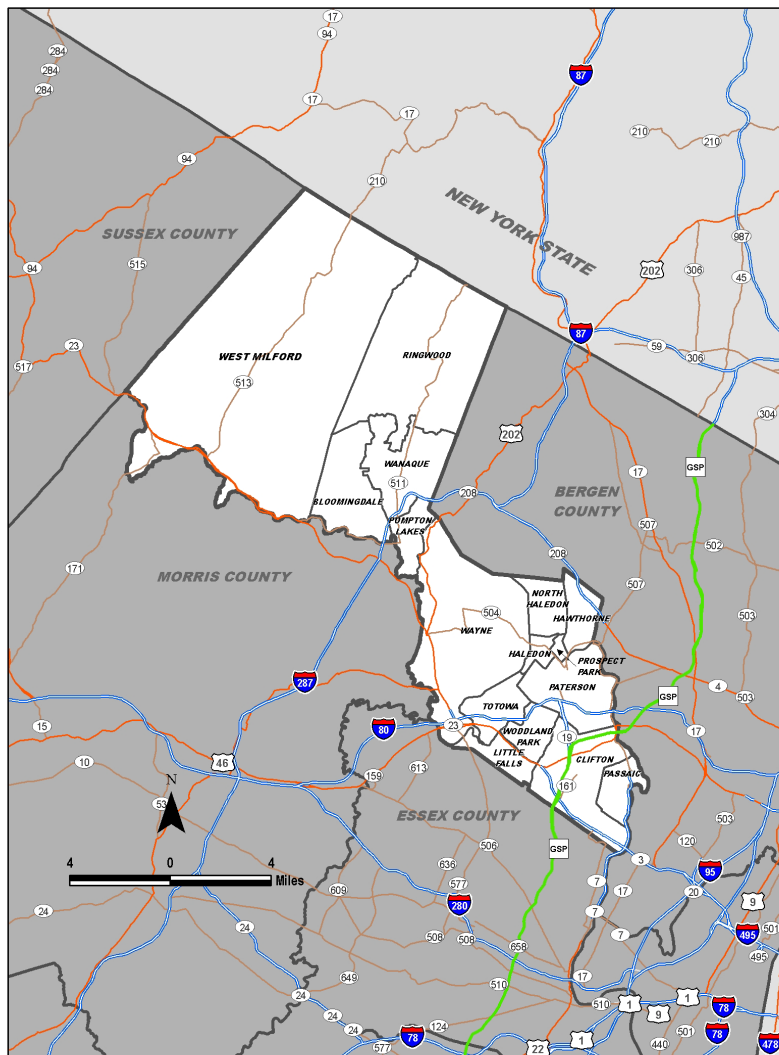
Passaic County has an unbroken legacy of entrepreneurship that dates from the 18th century and actively encourages business expansion and new business relocations into our community. The County is comprised of 16 municipalities in 197.05 square miles, with a population of 524,118 (2020). The County contains urban, suburban and rural settings from the developed urban centers of the cities of Paterson and Passaic to the sparsely developed and picturesque region of the Highlands with its mountains and lakes located in the Townships of West Milford and Ringwood. Paterson, the County seat, is a dramatic representation of one of the earliest experiences of industrialization, when Alexander Hamilton, then Secretary of the US Treasury, established the “Society for Establishing Useful Manufactures,” the country’s first planned industrial park. Passaic County continues to welcome business and innovation.

Location

Conveniently situated in the heart of Northern New Jersey, surrounded by Bergen, Morris, Essex and Sussex counties, Passaic County is a desirable location for both employers and employees. Passaic County is located in the metropolitan New York-New Jersey area and is located 11 1/2 miles from the George Washington Bridge and approximately 13 miles from the Lincoln Tunnel and 17 miles from the Holland Tunnel. Because of its centralized location, Passaic County boasts easy accessibility by automobile, bus, freight and passenger train and air from the tri-state region. The county is at the crossroads of a number of New Jersey’s major interstate highways, (Routes 80, 287, 3, 19, 20, 21, 23, 46, 202, 208 and the Garden State Parkway and New Jersey Turnpike) linking the County to New York State, Pennsylvania and Connecticut. The County’s location also provides ready accessibility to three international airports (Newark Liberty, LaGuardia and John F. Kennedy) along with major international shipping ports (Port Newark and Port Elizabeth).

Opportunity Zone Overview and Incentives

The Opportunity Zones program was enacted as part of the 2017 federal Tax Cuts and Jobs Act and is designed to drive long-term capital investments into low-income rural and urban communities. This federal program provides opportunities for private investors to support investments in distressed communities through participation in Qualified Opportunity Funds.

Investors can defer paying federal taxes on capital gains reinvested in Qualified Opportunity Funds that invest in low-income communities, under rules released by the U.S. Department of the Treasury. Reinvested capital gains are deferred from taxation until exit from a Qualified Opportunity Fund or December 31, 2026, whichever comes first. However gains from Qualified Opportunity Fund investments held for the long term are taxed at reduced rates, with the rate reductions increasing at the 5, 7, and 10 year marks. Any gains from Qualified Opportunity Fund investments held for at least 10 years will be permanently excluded from the capital gains tax.

Permit Readiness Checklist

The Readiness Checklist (formerly “scorecard”) initiative is a business practice improvement to help applicants and Department program staff/managers to better understand project readiness. Use of the readiness checklist will help identify, before the start of the regulatory process, if a planned project is ready for detailed review by the Department and to identify regulatory issues that may need to be addressed. In addition to framing the project site (lot and block information, acreage, topographic mapping), the checklist will address project ownership, local zoning consistency, water supply, wastewater capacity, the need for additional internal and external governmental approvals, and proposed environmental enhancements.

The checklist is organized into a series of questions that help to identify project readiness. A “score” is not actually tabulated, but the identification of regulatory consistency issues will help the applicant and the Department to determine, before a proposed project is submitted to DEP for review, whether the project will easily meet DEP technical and policy requirements, or if it will require a more complicated review and/or project modifications.

Upon successful completion and Departmental review of the readiness checklist, the applicant is ready to request a full permit coordination team and a pre-application meeting with the submittal of a permit identification form, site maps, and development plan.

William Paterson University Small Business Development Center (WPU SBDC)

America's Small Business Development Centers (SBDC) were established in 1977 and can be found in every state in the U.S. Twelve SBDC regional offices are located throughout New Jersey. The SBDC at William Paterson University began serving area small business owners in April 1997 and is supported through a grant from the New Jersey Business Action Center and several other institutions and foundations.
